PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Meeting Rooms

It appears that we will need to relocate to a new venue. I heard from another car club that the arrangements at Strathfield Golf Club had changed and that the caterers were now looking after the hiring of the meeting rooms.

For several weeks I have been trying to find out from the golf club what was happening, and my emails were being referred to the caterers and my phone calls were also not being responded to. Last Saturday afternoon I received an email advising that the new arrangements were to take effect from October. For the room that we are now meeting in the hire cost was going to be \$1,400. This includes a "catering package" of \$750 (which appears to be in the form of vouchers to be used in the bistro) and the remaining \$650 for room hire and the a.v. equipment.

After representation based on the fact that our efforts to get to the



bottom of what was happening the caterers agreed on Sunday to waive the charges until next year. This was a bit of relief for me as I was attempting to locate alternate premises in hurry.

It is obvious that the golf club no longer want the car clubs (I understand that there were 18 each month) so we need to find a new location. I am going to need some assistance with this and would appreciate

• any suggestions (Rydalmere bowling Club and Carnarvon Golf Club have been suggested already and;

• members to check out the venues and report back.

I've been trying to get more specific details of what options Strathfield are offering but unfortunately this will not happen prior to this report going to Patrick, but I will bring the meeting up to date on Thursday. It would be really good if we can have a good roll up to the bistro as it may help to demonstrate that although the room hire was at no cost the bistro was the winner.


Historic Vehicle Registration News If you have a car on Conditional (Historic Vehicle) Registration you should read this.

What's the answer to the ultimate question? Why is it relevant to your car being Conditionally Registered in NSW? What is the ultimate question?

The last one is easy. The Ultimate Question of Life, The Universe, and Everything. What does it all mean? Or to quote the good professor with fuzzy hair. "Why is it so?"

What in heaven's name is he talking about? Why is it relevant to having my car inspected and being declared as a current AHOC member?

You probably won't believe that the answer is the



same for all the above. If you haven't worked it out yet, it's 42.

Yes that's the magic number. If you have your car inspected by one of our volunteer inspection officers, the certification that it's roadworthy is valid for 42 days. My declaration at the bottom of the Historic Vehicle Declaration is also valid for 42 days.

If you don't finalise the renewal within 42 days of either signature or both, the friendly person at Services NSW will tell you to go away and do it all again.

If you're wondering about a pink slip, well that's valid for six months, but the membership declaration is still 42 days. Yes, it's been known that some members sit on their forms and when told to do it all again start to wave their arms around. Them's the rules!

Once again here are the instructions on renewing the Conditional Registration of your car.

• Once you have received the renewal papers from Transport for NSW, arrange for your vehicle to be inspected for roadworthiness by either an Authorised Inspection Station or one of the volunteer AHOC inspection officers. See page 2 of this Flat Chat for their contact details. Remember all vehicles, including Historic vehicles need to be inspected and passed as roadworthy.

• Complete the left-hand side of the "Historic Vehicle Declaration" and post it to me at my home address (See page 2 of this Flat Chat for my address) along with an indication that your car is roadworthy or a copy of the pink slip. Please include a stamped self-addressed envelope. There is no need to send me the registration certificate. Do not post the documents by Registered Post as that just slows downs the process as I have to go to the post office to accept a registered postal item.

• Once returned, either go to your local Services NSW office to do the renewal or post to Transport for NSW in Parkes. That address can be found on the registration papers.

Goulburn Historic Waterworks Museum

Set on the Wollondilly River at Marsden Weir, the museum is the site of Goulburn's early water supply. Built between 1883-1885, the steam operated pumping facility provided Goulburn's first reticulated water supply. The pump house still contains the original the Appleby Bros. beam engine of dramatic proportion and in operational condition. In an adjoining room, massive electric motors and pumps remain in place from more recent operations. The building also houses a horizontal steam engine built in 1866 by Hick, Hargreaves & Co., Bolton, UK.



The site allows visitors to experience the 1880's steam beam engine in full operation. A vertical boiler provides steam power to operate the steam engine and pumps.

World's Hottest Day

Lately there has been a bit of interest on Facebook in the All Healey Race held at Amaroo Park on Sunday 30 January 1977.

I remember it well as it was the hottest and most uncomfortable I had ever been in an Austin-Healey.



Donald Healey was there as he was in Sydney for a few days after visiting Melbourne. After us, he was heading to New Zealand. To commemorate Donald's visit a special race for Healeys and Austin-Healeys was scheduled for the Sunday.

It was the world's hottest day and in the main All Healey race I was on the third row of the grid in the 100 I had at the time. Sounds impressive, but it was a handicap race with the slowest cars at the front and fastest at the rear. The object being that all cars should reach the checkered flag at the same time. Fred Vogel was in the row in front of me in his Healey Silverstone and next to him was Chris Gray in a yellow Bugeye Sprite. At the back was hard charger Peter Hopwood in a very quick 100/6 and alongside him was Roger Wells in the MacHealey.

After two laps Peter went to overtake me, but with an audible bang, his engine expired. Half a lap later Roger went past on the straight in the MacHealey, that was painted red at the time. Roger went on to be first across the line and received the trophy from Donald. Sadly, both Peter, Roger and Fred are no longer with us. Of course Donald died in January 1988.



Austin-Healeys at the Hotel de France By John Young

A couple days ago, I was leaving our French village when an immaculate Austin-Healey passed heading in the opposite direction. I recognised the car immediately as the black BN2 of Jeanluc Serreau, who happens to be the President of Club Healey France, and lives a couple of villages from us.

I figured that he was probably heading to the Hotel de France in La Chartre-sur-le-Loir, so I thought I'd return via the village square to see if I was right. Sure enough, the BN2 was outside, along with another six Big Healeys and two Bugeyes. So Helen and I went in and met a great group of Austin-Healey enthusiasts, some of whom had just finished a seven-day rally.





However why would these classics be gathered outside this particular hotel?

It's all about history. In the '50s, Englishman John Wyer was managing the Aston Martin works team for Le Mans, which happens to be 45 minutes away. Wyer was a man who liked his food, and a deal was done whereby the hotel would be HQ, and the owner, a renowned chef, would prepare food for the team over the weekend. In 1959, the hotel had its first victory when Roy Salvadori and Carroll Shelby brought home the winners' laurels. In the bar, there's a photo of the two men sitting on the car outside the hotel after the race. Wyer went on to manage several other teams, notably the Gulf GT40s and Porsche 917s. Right up to the 1970 race, the cars were driven on the road to the circuit!

Now owned by English enthusiast Martin Overington, the hotel's extraordinary motoring heritage comes to life in the famous brasserie with its specially designed wallpaper: a montage of all visiting drivers and key events over the years. Memorabilia and vintage racing photographs also adorn the walls. The hotel is also an excellent touring base: miles of famously empty roads and wide, sweeping curves beckon in all directions. The Le Mans circuit and museum are still a drawcard, while the Loire Valley offers chateaux and vineyards to the south.



In other words, the Hotel de France is exactly where you'd expect to find a gathering of Austin-Healeys. Or Astons, Porsches, Ferraris or Jaguars. After the Le Mans Classic in 2023, the entire village square was given over to vintage Bentleys. Hero drivers like Derek Bell and Jacky Ickx are still regular visitors.

It's a mecca for enthusiasts, and that, of course, is how we ended up living in the village three months a year.
