EXHAUST LEAKS



Welcome to the AHOC New Year and its first issue of the Flat Chat Newsletter.

I'll let you all in on a little secret. One of my New Year's Resolution is not to complain about the lack of content for Flat Chat. So that's it, no more. If later issues just have minutes and committee/chapter reports, minutes you will know why.

So what's in this issue besides the normal committee reports and minutes? There some words by Denis Kasza on getting together at the Erina Men's Shed and previews on the next visit by the Illawarra and Southern Highlands AHOC Chapter.

The big news to be found on page 9 is that we are moving to Carlingford Sports and Recreation Club for our monthly meetings starting on Wednesday 5 February. Yes you did read that right, it's a Wednesday.

Over the last few days, I have been servicing our 2004 Mercedes-Benz and the Quinn Austin-Healey, built 50 years later. Chalk and cheese?

Yes definitely, as apart from that they both have oil in the engines that's about where the similarities finish. I use Penrite oil in both with the MB taking HPR05-5W40 at \$72 for five litres and Classic Light 20W-60 for the AH at \$57. Both take between seven and eight litres.

I don't have a hoist so with the MB it's moving the trolley jack from one side of the car to the other while placing the jack stands into position. Much of the suspension is made from aluminium so it's a matter of placing the jack under the steel bits. That takes time as does undoing the 12 screws holding all the plastic covers under the engine and transmission. Of course the spanner to undo the drain plug needed a hefty shove with my left leg while my back was braced up to the wall.

Oil drained! Wait for a few hours and reinstall the plug. Then refit the plastic covers while lying on my back. Manoeuvre the trolley jack and remove the jack stands. Now the simple part, change the filter which is a cartridge type easily accessible at the top of the engine. Empty the first bottle of oil into the engine, followed by another two litres. Did I mention there was no dipstick? You need to sit in the driver's seat and by pressing a few buttons in the correct sequence it tells you. Top up if necessary. Total time taken not including the draining time – four hours.

The Quinn Austin-Healey? Loosen the spin-on oil filter and then with the trolley jack and a piece of soft timber jack up the front of the car, and position the jack stands. Loosen the drain plug, slide the catch bowl underneath and remove the plug. Let drain for a couple of hours. Remove and replace the oil filter.

Fill with fresh oil, check with the dipstick and top up if necessary. Total time taken excluding draining - 45 minutes.

I trust you enjoy this issue of the Flat Chat Newsletter, and as usual I am looking forward to receiving lots of words and photos of what you have been up to with your Austin-Healeys.

He'd also taken delivery of a final batch of windscreens, available at \$280 each.


SHOW & TELL

There are Delegates and then there are Delegates

To alleviate your concerns as to the difference between National Delegates and National Assn Delegates as can be found on page 2, Jim Phillips has penned the following explanatory words.

These are two different groups that are part of the Australian Austin-Healey club movement.

The National Delegates are two representatives from each of the clubs who discuss ideas that have, or may have, application across all clubs. These ideas are agreed by the individual club's committee to be raised so that they do not represent the views of a single delegate. Similarly, the decisions from the national delegates meeting can only be agreed by the club's committee.

Historically this group only ever met once a year at the National Rally presided by the host club. Obviously, this arrangement meant that ideas took years to implement. An example is the national magazine which you all receive, took years from the conception to the publication of the first prototype magazine. More recently and with the acceptance of Zoom meetings it was decided to give this group a more formal structure with an elected president and secretary and meetings to be held each quarter.

The National Delegates vote on the national Alan Jones Trophy as well as the Hard Luck Trophy for each of the national rallies. Recently the criteria for awarding the Alan Jones trophy has been revised.

In some clubs the national delegates are advertised as being the contacts for overseas visitors.

The delegates representing the NSW club are the pres-

The delegates representing the NSW club are the president. Dianne Lawlor and Geoff Smith.

The Association of Australian Austin-Healey Clubs.

The sole purpose of this association is to publish the Australian Austin-Healey journal. Being an association registered in NSW its members must be real persons and cannot be entities such as another incorporation. Consequently, each club nominates two members to be members of the Association. Members of the Austin-Healey Car Club of New Zealand are also members of the national association. This association also meet via Zoom which can be a challenge due to the four or five hour difference between Auckland and Perth. The Australian Austin-Healey is edited by Patrick Quinn and the editors of each of the individual clubs are involved in providing material. The management of the Association is mainly involved in invoicing clubs for the copies of each journal and paying the accounts. It is a not-for-profit organisation.

The members representing the NSW club are Jim Phillips and Gordon Lynas.

Historic Vehicle Registration News

If you have a car on Conditional (Historic Vehicle) Registration you should read this.

Another year has slipped past altogether far too quickly. However, all is not lost if you have a car that was built in 1995 as any vehicle built in that year is now eligible for Conditional Registration.

Just a day or two back I received a call from a club member who has just picked up a 1995 Toyota Celica in excellent condition. He visited the local Services NSW office to ask for the necessary forms and somehow the conversation got around to needing a Blue Slip and hip, hip hooray he was given the correct advice.

Unless there have been some serious modifications you don't need a Blue Slip for the Conditional Registration of

a vehicle that has been previously fully registered. All you need is for me to certify your vehicle as roadworthy on the Historic Vehicle Declaration. Now for me to be satisfied that your car is roadworthy, I need to sight a Pink Slip or for the vehicle to be inspected by one of our three volunteer inspectors.

In case you don't realise it, the vehicle on Conditional Registration is not restricted to a car and can include a motorcycle, scooter or trailer. Also the AHOC doesn't restrict vehicles to marque only and all that are 30 years old are eligible. While all trailers 30 years and older we do have a Healey trailer within the club that was supplied by the Donald Healey Motor Company to the purchaser of a Healey boat.

Some members are still living in the past and sending envelopes with \$1.20 stamps. A stamp to post a normal letter within Australia is \$1.50, not \$1.20.

Here they are - the instructions on renewing the Conditional Registration of your car.

- Once you have received the renewal papers from Transport for NSW, arrange for your vehicle to be inspected for roadworthiness by either an Authorised Inspection Station or one of the volunteer AHOC inspection officers. See page 2 of this Flat Chat for their contact details. Remember all vehicles, including Historic vehicles need to be inspected and passed as roadworthy.
- Complete the left-hand side of the "Historic Vehicle Declaration" and post it to me at my home address (See page 2 of this Flat Chat for my address) along with an indication that your car is roadworthy or a copy of the pink slip. Please include a stamped self-addressed envelope. There is no need to send me the registration certificate. Do not post the documents by Registered Post as that just slows downs the process as I have to go to the post office to accept a registered postal item.
- Once returned, either go to your local Services NSW office to do the renewal or post to Transport for NSW in Parkes. That address can be found on the registration papers.

Bought Two, Sold Three

Over the last couple of months there has been the occasion to tell the story of two BJ8s that we bought and imported from the US. One was an early 1965 model in Healey Blue (HBJ8L/31001) that is now owned by club members Tony and Samantha Bond and the other was in Colorado Red (HBJ8L/40032) now owned by Nick and Loula Georgouras who are also members.

The story of buying, importing, enjoying, selling, buying, enjoying and selling the blue car is long winded and while it's been told before, it's worth rendering again. The red car however was straightforward although it was bought on eBay.

The story of the blue car is all true! Yes it is! Only the names have been changed to protect the innocent!



It goes back to the beginning of 2012 when we decided to buy a BJ8 from the US. It wasn't because I really wanted an Austin-Healey with wind-up windows and a glove box, but it was Caroline's suggestion. Being a dutiful husband I always do what I'm told, especially when it concerns buying an Austin-Healey. Besides it seemed like an enjoyable way to spend and make a few dollars.

Despite being then a 40+ year Austin-Healey owner I had never owned a BJ8, so was looking forward to it. So with a budget of \$40K I set forth to see what I could find. I thought about the condition of the car and decided against something freshly restored and overpriced. I certainly didn't want a car that needed stacks of work either as I already had plenty of that. More like a car that had been reasonably well looked

after or perhaps an older restoration with its gloss well-worn away. All the usual places were looked at – Hemmings, eBay, AH club magazines and so on. It didn't take all that long to find a white example in North Carolina and after a few emails I had arranged for a fellow owner to have a looksee. It got the thumbs down due to a few issues, plus it was a little over budget.

A couple weeks later the bloke who looked at the car told the story at a meeting of his local Austin-Healey club. Up popped the hand of another bloke who said he had a '65 BJ8 for sale. A flurry of emails and phone calls resulted in a done deal. The photos certainly appealed along with the list of things he had done to the car the year before which set him back just over US\$20K.

So what did he want for this piece of automotive treasure complete with new leather trim, carpets etc. etc? \$40,000. However this was in US dollars and in early 2012 our brave Aussie dollar would buy US\$1.0687 meaning that the cost to us was Au\$37,428.65. Whoo Hoo! Yes of course I shopped around for the best exchange rate and I must admit the banks were found lacking. A friend put me on to OZFOREX Foreign Exchange Services where the rate was between 1c and 1.5c better than the banks. May not sound much, but when you are looking at figure of around US\$40,000 that equated to \$600 of our money.





Rollercoaster

Then started almost three months of what I thought was an interesting rollercoaster ride of shipping the car from the US East Coast to Australia. I intended on selling the car and the thought of driving/selling a left-hand-car in a right-hand-drive world didn't appeal. I'm as capable of wielding a spanner as good as the next bloke but with the other Quinn AH slowly going back together after its engine disgraced itself on the way to the 2011 Adelaide Rally, I didn't want to do it.



So I decided to have the car shipped to Melbourne where Steve Pike of Marsh Classic Restorations had agreed to do the deed for me.

For shipping I contacted a San Diego based company called 'Ship Overseas', but as they say in the classics — "The job isn't finished, until the paperwork is done." For instance it's not possible to ship a car out of the US unless you have a Certificate of Title. Then you need a Vehicle Import Approval before you can import a car into Australia.

Looking back it was a bit of a risk to ship by roll-on/roll-off, but if I didn't this story would be a little less interesting. The cost was US\$2,256.00 plus US\$600.00 insurance which was around Au\$2,694.00. I used a credit card to pay for this which was a mistake as my friendly(?) bank charged me a \$65 international transfer fee. Should have used OZFOREX as they charge just \$10 for transfer of less than \$10K and above that it's free.

The seller had a Certificate of Title, but a Vehicle Import Approval from the Australian Department of Infrastructure and Transport couldn't be applied



for until after the dollars had left the comfort of my account and the Bill of Sale or receipt had been received.

So I had the warm feelings of owning a 1965 Austin-Healey on the other side of the world but no approval to import it. The appropriate forms were received and I was comforted by the large letters on top of the first page which said —

DO NOT SHIP YOUR VEHICLE UNTIL AFTER YOU HAVE RECEIVED YOUR IMPORT APPROVAL.

Is it only me who sees some lack of logic in all this?



Four weeks after I sent the forms in and paid a further \$50 the approval was received which in turn was sent to 'Ship Overseas'. While all this was going on I had to rely on the good graces of the seller to look after the car (and my money). However knowing that he was a member of his local Austin-Healey club did warm up my feelings.



Bon Voyage

A few days later the car was transported by trailer from North Carolina to Jacksonville, Florida for shipping on the Norwegian owned car-carrier *Hoegh Singapore*. If you have ever seen a RORO ship it looks like a floating rectangular box that would turn turtle at the slightest breeze.

Shipping from Florida to Australia! In anyone's mind, surely it would be straight to the Panama Canal and then across the Pacific? Not quite, as car-carrying ships are like a bus with a pre-determined route. If you have one car or a thousand it's a matter of putting out your hand and catching it to a convenient port.

Through the wonders of the Internet and www. marinetraffic.com I could see that the *Hoegh Singa-pore* headed south to Galveston, then to my dismay it sailed north of Cuba, across the Atlantic towards Africa. The ship's next port of call was Lagos, Nigeria followed by Cotonou, which is the largest city in the republic of Benin. Can't say that I had ever heard of Cotonou and I certainly had never heard of Tema, a major port in Ghana where it stopped a few days later.

By this stage I was thinking that the car was on a Cook's Tour of the world, but thanks to Dr Google I soon became knowledgeable of such places. My feelings did become quite cool when I read the phrase 'pirate activity'.

Then I noticed that the ship was due to stop at Dakar in Senegal before heading north to Spain. 'What about my car?' flashed across my mind which was




followed by a flurry of emails resulting in me finding that the car was to be off-loaded in Dakar where it was to cool its tyres for five days before being picked up by the Hoegh Seoul heading south from the UK.

With images in my mind of the flying Ferrari in the film *Ferris Beuller's Day Off*, I was assured by Hoegh Autoliner's representative in Australia of sufficient security in Dakar.

On Time

The *Hoegh Seoul* arrived on time, picked up the car and headed south around the bottom of Africa to Durban, South Africa and then to Maputo, the capital of Mozambique which is only two countries south of Somalia – and pirates. Next it turned east across the Indian Ocean and its next stop – Fremantle. Despite being still a week and a half away I felt as if the journey was almost at an end. Then it hit a storm at sea and just before marinetraffic.com lost contact with the *Hoegh Seoul*, the local winds were being recorded at 65knots. The insurance cover was cold comfort.

My ship came in, literally, on 1 August, but while it was unloaded within a few hours there were still three or four days before the car was ready to be picked up. However this could only occur after I



paid out \$5,718.35 in various fees, including GST of \$4,354.08 which, as far as I could see, was 10% of no figure that had been spent.

Two weeks later I walked into Marsh Classic Restorations and saw the BJ8 for the first time. Steve Pike had picked up the car and done the conversion to RHD. Thankfully I couldn't see any signs of pirate



activity, but there was a lot of sand in the passenger side footwell. Steve said that he had vacuumed it three times which made me wonder what the countryside was like around Dakar – horizon to horizon desert.

The drive back to Sydney was uneventful. We took it to a few events such as the 2012 AHOC NSW concours. I was enjoying the car and must admit that it was put up for sale on Carsales.com.au rather reluctantly.

I suspect that everyone reading this would know what you can pay for a BJ8 in going condition. From anywhere in the high \$50Ks right up to \$140Ks so I priced the car at the lower end of the scale for an unrestored car, albeit reasonably well maintained. Our car certainly wasn't a concours winner, but it was ready to use and enjoy in any weather. Finished in Healey Blue with new trim and shiny 72 spoke chrome wires it was a good looking car. With that in mind it was listed at \$68,000.

Phone Calls

It sat on Carsales for a number of months and there were a few calls from telephonic tyre kickers, but nothing of worth. We took the car to the 2013 National Rally with a 'For Sale' sign on the screen, but nothing. Then in July I received a couple of emails through the Carsales system which didn't say much except to provide a phone number which I called. It was a gentleman by the name of Fred Bloggs (not his real name of course) who lived in Perth. It turned out that Fred was in hospital after a knee reconstruction and importantly he was interested in the 3000. After a short chat he said that it sounded exactly what he wanted and that he would send an \$8K deposit that day. As to the rest he was waiting to the end of the month for a business arrangement to finalise. That night our account was \$8,000 healthier.

It turned out that Fred was a builder, but clearly it had been a long time since he had swung a hammer. True to his word the \$60K arrived in the account about a month later and in the meantime the car sat unused, as I no longer considered it to be our car.

About six weeks later Fred and his wife Mabel (also not her real name) arrived in Sydney. In earlier

phone conversations Fred said that they would catch a cab to our home. We live about 80 kilometres from Sydney and I suggested that to save themselves a hundred or so dollars a train might be better.

I met them at the train station and my first thought on seeing Fred was 'You ain't going to fit!' He was about my height at 5ft 10in, but not quite the same elsewhere. Later at our home he didn't appear to be in the best of health. They were with us for an hour or so while we had coffee. We warmed to them both as they were nice people and he made mention of his collection of cars, but not in a way that sought to impress. The cars were housed in a purpose building and it sounded like no expense had been spared.

Cramped

On leaving, Fred got behind the steering wheel and was clearly cramped. I moved the steering wheel forward and the seat back as far as it would go, but it was still very tight. Remember it's a BJ8 and unlike the earlier models the seat could not go back further due to the rear suspension hump in the floor.

Their intention was to drive back to their hotel in Sydney and then on to Adelaide, put the car on a truck and they would fly back to Perth. I gave them a week to get there and called him. On telling me what had happened I was lost for words – a rare occurrence.

"I had trouble driving it so Mabel drove it along the coast to Melbourne and we sold it!"

They had got as far as Melbourne and went to The Healey Factory. There they traded the BJ8 for \$50K





on a more expensive but fully restored BT7 Mk2. He said they had some overheating problems with the car and remarked on his difficulty in driving comfortably. Someone later said to me that as it's 1,040 kilometres from Sydney to Melbourne via the coast, Fred and Mabel's trip cost them \$17.31 per kilometre.

The following week Caroline suggested that we should buy it back from The Healey Factory. After initially thinking not to, I checked and found out they would sell the car as is for \$60,000 and failing that they would repair some chassis dents, paint underneath/wheel arches, paint the sump and machine polish the paint. I discussed this with Steve Pike who suggested that I offer \$57,500 which I did and it was duly accepted.

The sum was paid and Steve picked up the car for us. It wasn't long before Caroline and I travelled south, stayed with our daughter who lives in Melbourne, picked up the BJ8 in Bacchus Marsh and headed home.

Sold Again

The car went back on Carsales, but within a couple of weeks I found out through a friend of a friend, that a collector was looking for an Austin-Healey. I made contact with him and after a test drive did the deal for \$65,000.




The slight complication was that the collection was in Tasmania. So part of the deal was to deliver the car to the collector's address in Tasmania. Thankfully he wasn't in too big a hurry and February 2014 saw us heading south again for the ferry across Bass

Straight. The car was delivered, which was followed by a little bit of touring in a rental that was so exciting that I have completely forgotten the make and model.

The next stage was serendipitous as everything just came together. We caught the ferry back to Melbourne, had coffee with our daughter and then caught the train to Bacchus Marsh to take delivery of the red BJ8 that had arrived a couple of weeks prior. Stayed with Steve and Helen Pike overnight and had an uneventful drive back to Sydney.

While our history with the blue BJ8 was certainly convoluted, it was the opposite with the red BJ8. We saw it on eBay and it was again around US\$40K when the exchange rate was certainly in our favour. It was for sale by a dealer located on Long Island and in very similar condition to the blue car. In some time in its past the car has received a particle restoration and was a good driving car. We sent a deposit of US\$1,000 by PayPal and paid the rest again by OZFOREX.



I arranged for the car to be tested by a local Austin-Healey owner who gave it the thumbs up. The dealer was very helpful, and this time shipping was arranged through Schumacher Cargo Logistics who was very helpful and efficient. Within a week the car was picked up and taken for shipping out of New York.

Again the transport was direct to Steve Pike and onboard a Chinese ship within a container it sailed south through the Panama Canal to a port in China where it was moved to a different ship for its ongoing journey to Melbourne. It arrived without a problem and Steve went to the docks to pick it up and take it back to Bacchus Marsh where he converted it to right hand drive.



We also used the red car for a time including to the 2014 AHOC concours on the Central Coast, before putting it up for sale on Carsales where it sold very quickly to Nick and Loula Georgouras who joined the AHOC.



As to the blue BJ8 I am pleased to say it was sold once again, but this time by the collector to Tony

Caroline was sad when the blue BJ8 was sold (twice), as it was/still is a lovely looking car, but she was assured(?) a couple of years later when the Healey Duncan entered the Quinn stable.

Buying and selling the BJ8s was interesting, and a few dollars were made, but would I do it again? Probably not, as changing circumstances such as exchange rates now not being in our favour; the com-



pletely unfair and illogical luxury car tax: and, the complexities presented by the asbestos requirements are all against it, unless the car is something really special.




Slow Road to Inverloch

You may have seen the flyer for this tour in last month's Flat Chat Newsletter. Since then, a number of people have booked, but there is still plenty of space for you to join us on what I'm sure will be a very enjoyable tour. The southeast coast is a beautiful part of the world and has roads that were largely laid out when our cars were new. In other words, they are great for cruising in an Austin-Healey! (Not too bad in a tin-top either!)

In addition to the details in last month's Flat Chat Newsletter I have included a second night at Lakes Entrance for those who wish to linger a little longer before driving home. If you wish to take up this option, please let me know when you make your booking.

As mentioned last month, this trip is for those who enjoy visiting a number of towns and having time to enjoy the scenery as they travel in the company of like-minded people.

The route is a leisurely wander to Inverloch via Nowra, Merimbula and Lakes Entrance before arriving at Inverloch in time for the National Rally, which starts on Tuesday 4 March. Even if you aren't attending the Rally, you can still travel with us to Lakes Entrance. As this is a perambulation to the Rally, the trip home is not included, but there are many options to tempt you on that return trip.



Depending on where your journey begins, I am planning to begin with a shortish drive to Nowra on Thursday 27th February, where we will stay at the George Bass Motel. This is off the main road, but centrally located in Nowra. We will meet to enjoy a welcoming drink and tasty dinner as we get together at our first stop. Nowra is 170kms (2hrs30) from Sydney.

On Friday 28th February we travel to Merimbula, staying for two nights. That is about 310kms and a 4hrs drive. There are a variety of pubs, restaurants and clubs in town for breakfasts, lunches and dinners. Saturday is a day for relaxing and enjoying this beautiful lakeside town.



Sunday 2 March will see us drive to Lakes Entrance, that is about 270kms or three hrs driving from Merimbula. As mentioned, you have the option of staying one or two nights here. Some of us will be continuing to Inverloch on Monday, however lakes Entrance seems a long way to go for a single night if you aren't going to the Rally, so please take the option of having another night here before returning home. Lakes Entrance is 254kms or 3hrs10 driving time from Inverloch.

There are a number of options besides returning the way we came, such as: returning to Orbost then heading via Delegate, Cooma and Canberra; continuing to Melbourne and returning via the Hume Highway; or perhaps trekking over the Victorian





High Country to Omeo, Bright and on via Albury or Corryong and Tumut. There are plenty of options, so get out your old maps and find an enjoyable route that Google Maps would never offer.


