We actually caught up with the rest of our group and we all arrived at the home of Julie and Garry Lee together. A great day and we went home also by the old highway.



It's sad to report the passing of AHOC honorary member Robert Cutler on Tuesday 11 February.

Bob had been associated with Austin-Healeys since 1958 when he entered his first competition event in his 100. Over the next few years he would race or hillclimb at such diverse locations as Gnoo Blas, Hume Weir, Tarrawingee, Bathurst, Catalina Park, Huntley, Waterfall, King Edward Park (Newcastle) and Silverdale.

However perhaps his greatest claim took place at the first race of the first meeting at the new Warwick Farm Raceway on Sunday 18 December 1960. A weekend that's also remembered for torrential rain.

The first race was for production sports cars, and Bob was on pole with motoring writer David McKay behind in a Morgan. The positioning was to remain for around three-quarters of the race, when Bob aquaplaned and spun in the appalling conditions, allowing McKay to get past. The race soon finished in that order, with the MGA of Harry Cape finishing in third.

Bob was raised on a tomato farm in the Narel-

lan-Oran Park area and went to school at Homebush Boys High School, whereby at the end of his schooling, he was first in the state in Technical Drawing.

He decided that he wanted to become an airline pilot, but found that without a scholarship he was unable. His second choice, electrical engineering took him all over the world working for Cable Makers. On retirement Bob and Helen his wife, moved to Eglinton, just north of Bathurst where they had a quarter horse stud.

I first met Bob towards the end of the 1970s after being introduced by Alan Jones. At a concours/display day held at Queen Elizabeth Park, Concord an unknown 100 had arrived on the scene, but it didn't take Alan all that long to discover that it was the ex-Bob Cutler car. It was for sale and in a short time sold to a collector, who still has it. (see July 2011 Flat Chat)

From then on Bob and I kept in contact, and he was a frequent visitor to our home when visiting Sydney from Bathurst. After a little prompting, Bob was keen on being more closely involved with the AHOC and he accepted invitations to attend events, espe-







cially as the award presenter at our annual display and concours. Bob would also attend competition events where our club was involved.

He soon became involved again in Motorsport and became a CAMS Gold Stewart and eventually a Senior International Stewart, Clerk of Course, Track Inspector, State Executive Member and Board Member. Bob was awarded the Australian Sports Medal by the Governor General on 24 October 2000.

Unfortunately, the wind was knocked out of his sails



In Glenn and Jenny, you could not find more enthusiastic members as they attended every meeting and event. Glenn was also very obliging with his time in helping fellow owners and Jenny was always by his side. Jenny took particular pride in her later acquired 3000 Mk1 that was sold new in Fiji.

They were very helpful during the 1980s when the first restoration of the Quinn Austin-Healey was coming to an end. For a time, I seemed to spend quite a bit of time at Narara on the Central Coast, and Jenny was always very welcoming in finding a place at the lunch table.

Unfortunately, Glenn and Jenny's marriage was rent asunder permanently and they went their separate

#### **Gnoo Blas Festival 2024**

We met our friends Chris and Stevka from the Chev Club at the Eastern Creek Service Centre for the drive to Orange, which was uneventful, except for a large truck that drove out across the highway, near Lucknow, blocking the road and almost causing a three-way collision.

That Gnoo Blas festival is a multi-club event with approximate 850 cars, trucks, agricultural equipment, motorcycles and bicycles on display. This year's display was the largest ever, with the Friday evening welcome barbecue held at Jack Brabham Park to kick off the weekend. We went to the local pub for dinner and entertainment.

Saturday's display packed the park with 850+ vehicles, with a few Austin-Healeys, big and small. We parked our Sprite with the BJ8 of Greg and Kerry Poole from Bathurst and a BN1 and BJ8 from Cowra.

John Kitchen from Bathurst brought along a collection of replica Victorian cycles, a penny farthing, and an American flyer.

The flyer is like a penny farthing, but with the small wheel is at the front that does the steering. John also had his 1867 Bone Shaker bicycle, which is the oldest cycle in Australia. John won the individual display award.

The evening's entertainment was at the Service Club starting with a buffet dinner and followed by a talk from Colin Bond, who raced Sprites early in his career. Also





talking was Ray Berghouse from Chevron Publishing and founder of Australian Muscle Car magazine. The subject matter was many photos relating to Touring Car Championship, its development and changes over the decades. The first championship was in 1960 at Gnoo Blas with only one race a year.

Will Hagon spoke and introduced 'Bomber' Moxham who raced at the Gnoo Blas circuit in 1953, the first year of racing. He also drove a Ford V8 in the 1953 Redex trial. I had great pleasure in speaking with Mr. Moxham, as my father Malcolm was in the 1953 Redex trial in Car 16, a Morris Minor.

On the Sunday morning, we met at the gardens and drove to Lake Canobolas for morning tea and a camel ride if you wished. Lunch was at the Waratah Sports Club.

The trip home was uneventful and relatively calm along the Great Western Highway. We have been to Gnoo Blas many times and have booked a motel for next year. A good weekend away.



## **Historic Vehicle Registration News**

If you have a car on Conditional (Historic Vehicle) Registration you should read this.

I seem to spend a lot of time quoting Professor Julius Sumner Miller with his often said saying "Why is it So?" Miller used the saying so often, that it became the name of his early ABC black and white television programme.

So why is it so? For the last few years at the bottom of this page I have included the steps that need to be taken when you renew the Conditional Registration of your car. During that time, I have reworded it numerous times in an effort to make it as simple as I possibly could.

Has it worked? Are members remembering what's involved annually? Frankly the answer is no, as I am still

receiving questions, I am not receiving a stamped self-address envelope or whatever. Sure I can understand when a member has only had their vehicle on Conditional Registration for 12 months and they are renewing for the first time. Happy to assist by sending a copy of Flat Chat so they can read the process and hopefully recall it in following years.


However what about members who have had their vehicle on Conditional Registration for some years and they still need to ask.

#### WHY IS IT SO?

Well here they are again - the instructions on renewing the Conditional Registration of your car through the Austin-Healey Owners Club of NSW. PLEASE READ!

- Once you have received the renewal papers from Transport for NSW, arrange for your vehicle to be inspected for roadworthiness by either an Authorised Inspection Station or one of the volunteer AHOC inspection officers. See page 2 of this Flat Chat for their contact details. Remember all vehicles, including Historic vehicles need to be inspected and passed as roadworthy.
- Complete the left-hand side of the "Historic Vehicle Declaration" and post it to me at my home address (See page 2 of this Flat Chat for my address) along with an indication that your car is roadworthy or a copy of the pink slip. Please include a stamped self-addressed envelope. There is no need to send me the registration certificate. Do not post the documents by Registered Post as that just slows downs the process as I have to go to the post office to accept a registered postal item.
- Once returned, either go to your local Services NSW office to do the renewal or post to Transport for NSW in Parkes. That address can be found on the registration papers.

Most of our attendees met at the Nungarry Rest Area Southbound and together we made our trip south to Huskisson. Austin-Healey drivers were Ernst Jensen (BT7) and David McIntyre (BJ8), while members included Rob Sassall, Colin Goldsmith, Fran and me. Friends included Brian and Jackie Carnegie, Terry Robinson and Jeff Goldsmith. Local AHOC members Gerry South (100 BN1) and Rex Kilner (100 BN1) met us at the Museum, while Gerry's wife Bernadette met us at our luncheon location.

We arrived at the Jervis Bay Maritime Museum and met up with Gordon and Louise Lynas, who took advantage of the event to spend a weekend in Huskisson.

The Huskisson Maritime Museum houses the Lady Denman ferry. The hull of which was commissioned by the Balmain New Ferry Company in 1911 and constructed by Joseph Dent's family on the shore of the Currambene Creek at Huskisson. It was completed in 1911 and towed to Sydney for the fitting of steam engines, by Chapman & Co, with the completion of the deck and cabins fitted at Mort's Dock.





The Lady Denman was retired in 1979 and was returned to her home at Huskisson in 1980 and is the only remaining wooden vessel of her kind in NSW. The Lady Denman Heritage Complex received a Federation Grant to house the vessel in a purpose-built display wing at the museum. The new annex was constructed within three years.

To move the ferry, a "dry dock" was built adjacent to the existing museum building. The "dry-dock" was flooded and the ferry floated in. It was a "very big" project. Not as simplistic as I described.

After spending a fascinating time at the Maritime Museum, we moved onto our luncheon venue. We found out at the last minute that the Huskisson Triathlon was to be held on the following weekend, meaning that Friday was 'set up and road closure day' for the event. We visited The Pelican Café & Restaurant at Kingfisher Reserve, Island Point Road,



St Georges Basin. Recommended by Gerry and Bernadette South it was a magic location on the water at St Georges Basin with great food and wonderfully pleasant proprietors.

There was however more to come, and the café is located next to the St Georges Basin boat ramp. Gerry explained that the massive hard stand concrete parking area and ramp was originally built during World War II as a base for 107 Squadron of Vought Kingfisher amphibious aircraft. These aircraft had

been re-located to St Georges basin from a base at Rathmines. The 107 Squadron was mainly involved in anti-submarine patrols.

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

# Rare Healeys at Amaroo

"Rob, when was the last time your car saw the light of day?" "Six years ago!" came the response.

So started the chain of events that saw the last racing car of the Donald Healey Motor Company (DHMC) hit the track once again.

The event that enticed it out of its lair was the Super Sprint Third Round of the Combined Sports Car Association 1994 Calendar at Amaroo Park, organised by the Austin-Healey Owners Club of NSW. Club life member Joe Armour hit upon the idea that the supersprint would be the perfect occasion to gently(?) parade some of the rarer Healeys and Austin-Healeys that reside in Australia.

Convincing Rob Harrison to bring out his Healey XR-37 was no mean feat. However, such an event would be perfect for a cantankerous racing car that had run very

few miles since a very hectic 24 hours in 1970. The Healey XR-37 started life as a coupé designated SR and ran at Le Mans in 1968 and 69, entered by the DHMC, with a Tasman series Coventry Climax two litre V8 (ex Jimmy Clark) - however, it was hopelessly overweight. With a change of rules for 1970 the car was rebuilt as an open sports prototype equipped with a three litre Repco-Brabham V8, courtesy of Sir Jack.

The XR-37 ran faultlessly in the 1970 Le Mans 24 Hour and was in 14th place on its last lap when an electrical fault put it out of the race. Rob purchased it directly from the DHMC following the running at Le Mans and imported it to Australia, minus its engine. An ex-Denny Hulme Tasman Series Repco-Brabham V8 was soon purchased. However the car now runs a Traco-Rover V8 while the

Repco awaits a rebuild.

So a fine winter's Sunday saw the XR-37 at Amaroo Park exactly as it was raced at Le Mans, except for the engine, some 24 years earlier. Other rare Healeys and Austin-Healeys on the day included the Healey Silverstone of Warwick and Jennifer Sell, the two Austin-Healey 100S cars of Ray Roberts and Murray Wells, the 100 BN3/1 (six

cylinder prototype) of Patrick and Caroline Quinn, the ex-Ross Bond racing 3000 MkI and Joe Armour's Sebring 3000.

The Healey Silverstone is one of 105 built during 1949 and '50 with Riley 2.4 litre running gear. Ray's 1005 has a long Australian racing history and was previously owned by three times Australian Grand Prix winner Doug Whiteford, then John Roxburgh and novelist John Cleary. The 100S of Murray Wells is the reconstruction of a totalled New Zealand car. The BN3/1 of Patrick and Caroline Quinn is the original six cylinder prototype produced by the DHMC.

While not a works car, the ex-Ross Bond Healey holds a special place in the hearts of those of us who remember the heady days of marque sports car racing of the sixties and early seventies. Now owned and beautifully restored by Colin Rule from the central coast, it was made special with Ross Bond at the helm once again. Joe's Sebring 3000 ran at the '65 Sebring Twelve Hour Race driven by Australian Paul Hawkins and the then British Saloon Car Champion, Warwick Banks. The spoils included a first in the under three litre Sports Class.

Of course, the day at Amaroo centred on the Super Sprint especially, since the entrants paid cash money to punt their cars around the track.

However the rare cars were given the chance to show their wares on the track. "It is not a race" we were told, and "passing is not allowed!" Five laps later, the adrenalin was flowing like the amber liquid during the days of six o'clock closing, but sadly we were flagged in.

The XR-37 circulated with great aplomb and apart from the oil trying to escape from the engine it ran without trouble. Rob came back to the pits fired with enthusiasm and looking forward to other opportunities to use his car.

The rest of the day was a series of photo shoots for the owners and their vehicles and a chance to do what classic car owners do best - gasbag to other owners about their cars.


